Evaluation criteria

The basis of evaluation will be based on the followings:

You'll get extra points for **nice illustrations** of your story.

While writing consider the followings as well as your grammar, spelling, punctuation and text cohesion.

Plot

Is the plot believable? Is the ending logical? Does the plot hold your interest? Is the conflict subtle and complex?

Theme

Told to reveal theme or just for entertainment? Present new ideas? Or an old cliche? Is the theme valid to you? Does it express truth?

Point of View

What is the point of view? Is it the best one? Does the point of view switch ?

Does the point of view help you understand characters better? Does the point of view help you learn important information?

Tone

What is the authors attitude towards the characters or world? How does the author convey that tone? Do the emotions in the story seem natural or unnatural?

Characters

Are the characters realistic? Are the motives clear? Are the main characters rounded or flat? Are the main characters dynamic or static? Setting

Does the story have a recognizable setting? Is it believable? What does the setting reveal about the characters? What mood does the setting evoke?

Style

Is the story well written? Are the words chosen carefully? Do the people talk as real people talk? Just a few helpful questions to create your character(s):

Once you have your idea, how can you go about turning it into a story? Some suggestions:

- Use our **character profile questionnaire** to develop your main character into a 3-dimensional person.
- Identify what the **main problem** facing your character in the story is. What **steps** will the character take to overcome the problem? What **complications** might arise when your character takes them? Make a list of ideas. If you like, write them on notecards and start playing with the order.
- Imagine one of the scenes in your head and start writing it. It doesn't have to be the first scene in the story. You can go back and write the story beginning later. Start with whatever scene is clearest in your imagination. Then move on to the next scene.
